DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Love is one of the single most written-about emotions in the human experience. Our lives are flooded with love songs. love poems, love stories, even sermons about God's love for humanity. The Abdication is no exception—its central concern is love. But love in The Abdication is not straightforward; it is convoluted, fragmented, blocked at every turn by barriers that are both social and psychological. The usual categories of platonic love, erotic love, and divine love seem to hinder more than help an understanding of the various loves of Christina's life. The need to sort them this way (both hers and our own) slices love into a number of sharp fragments that are too dangerous to grasp. The *Abdication* is about the love of self and the love of others: about the fractures we create within those loves by setting people apart from one another through power structures. and apart from themselves through our rules about how people ought to think, behave, and feel. Answers to this problem are neither clear nor easy, but Wolff's unconventional script challenges us to try to find them. The Abdication demands that we find both the question and the answer embedded in the play's final line: "Why?"
