Director's Notes



Horror is a hugely popular genre in the United States today. Even if you are not a big fan of horror movies, you probably know all the tropes—the slasher coming to get you, the eerie soundtrack, the disturbing mutations of body horror, the acrobatic contortions of ghosts and monsters, and even the problematic idea that the characters somehow set themselves up to deserve what they get.

What you probably don't know is that the conventions we are so familiar with in American horror film today were pioneered on the Japanese kabuki stage over two hundred years ago, well before the invention of film. Kabuki theatre was justly famous for its special effects, which, in a completely live context, were virtually indistinguishable from magic. The kabuki ghost plays of the nineteenth century (employing acrobats to play the ghosts with twisted and seemingly impossible movements) literally and figuratively set the stage for the conventions that would later move from the theatre to film in Japan—and from Japanese to American film—to create the genre of horror as we know it today. And the most famous and influential of the kabuki ghost plays was Tsuruya Nanboku IV's *Ghost Stories at Yotsuya*, whose echoes can be found in transnationally famous movies like *The Ring* and *The Grudge*.

Despite the important place that this play holds in the history of horror and its development as a genre—and despite its continued popularity and fame in Japan—*Ghost Stories at Yotsuya* remains surprisingly obscure in the English-speaking world. No full English translation of the play has ever been published. For our production, we have collaborated across the Pacific with the famous kabuki translator Mark Oshima to work out the version we present to you today. It is my hope that our production, with its blend of elements from the nineteenth-century and the twenty-first, America and Japan, stage convention and film, will bring home to the horror fans among you (and the historians, and the film buffs!) the great debt that American horror owes to Japan, and the debt that film owes to the stage.

Dramaturg's Notes



First performed as a kabuki play in 1825, Ghost Stories at Yotsuya, or Yotsuya Kaidan, as it was originally called, was well received by audiences. By the early 1900's the play had been adapted for more than 30 movies and still has an influence on horror stories today. Because of how famous the play was and has continued to be, Oiwa, the main female character in the show, has become the most well-known ghost in Japan.

From the 12th to 19th century, Samurai were important in Japanese culture and they were more of a social class than an occupation. Their code of conduct, the Bushido Code, covered topics like Japanese values and traditions has been the building blocks of ethics taught in Japan today. The eight principles covered in the Bushido Code are justice, courage, compassion, respect, integrity, honor, loyalty, and self-control. Of all the principles, loyalty is heavily focused on in Ghost Stories at Yotsuya. Samurai would serve a lord in return for payment and would remain loyal until they died or were banished. To them, loyalty was very important, to the point that they would commit ritual suicide to prove it.

Before science was used to explain how things happened, demons and ghosts were often blamed in early Japanese mythological stories. There were so many of these stories told that eventually subcategories were developed. Ghost Stories at Yotsuya falls under yurei, or vengeful spirits. Many of the stories of yurei are demonized women who seek revenge and torment the man who wronged them. These stories are evidence of the historically long repressed fear of the opposite sex in Japan.

Ghost Stories at Yotsuya follows the dramatized version of the real-life story of Oiwa who died in 1636. Of those who know of the story, it is a common superstition that her ghost haunts her grave as well as the performance of the play itself. Oiwa's first memorial was a temple and shrine located where her family's home used to be. Eventually, the memorial was burnt down in a fire, so it was rebuilt in Tokyo where it stayed for almost 100 years until firebombs destroyed it during WWII. Her final memorial was built in Tokyo where she is supposedly buried. Many accidents and deaths have been linked to the production of this show, so it has been increasingly common for cast and crew members who perform her play to try and visit her grave and ask permission to perform the show.
