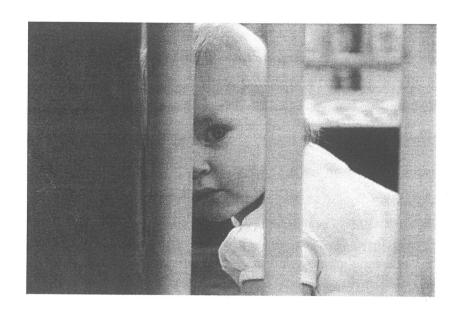

Dark Comedy: It's an interesting genre: it forces us to laugh at things we would never find funny in any other context. It forces us to think about what we're laughing at.

Raised in Captivity will make you laugh. The laughter is practically written in between the lines. But it will also make you think. What exactly is the laughter about? What is it that makes the jokes seem just a little off? What's lurking there, just under the surface, under the laughter?

Some of these lurkers will surface over the course of the play. Others will never be treated with anything but a flippant comment or a light joke. But I would urge you to root them out: all of them. You may just find that comedy can be the most serious genre of all.

FESTIVAL BIOS

Haviva Avirom (Los Angeles, Calif.) has been a theater practitioner for 13 years, plus or minus a few, and a working dramaturg for the last six. At Puget Sound, her work includes *Angels in America, Echoes, Richard III*, and *A Midsummer Night's Dream* for the theatre department; *In the Drawing Room, Incident at Ebony Inn*, and artistic producing for the Infinite Monkeys Festival; and as work on the Town Crier Speaks Festival, multiple operas, and UPSStage M!— a total of 42 shows in her college career. She is a dramaturg, lighting designer, sound designer, board op, stage manager, house manager, director, producer, and full-time Shakespeare nut.

Since winning the role of the title character in her second grade class's production of Zingarella and the Magic Pasta Pot by guessing the correct number (40), Katelyn Bruhn has been enamored with the stage. She originally intended to graduate from University of Puget Sound with a degree in mathematics, but five years and 20 productions have proved her wrong. From student theater productions to the department main stage shows to Student Directed One-Acts to Senior Theatre Festival, Katelyn has participated in nearly all aspects of theatrical production, including acting, directing, stage managing, design, and costume construction. Although she isn't sure yet what she will do with this degree thing (odds are good for "framing"), no doubt it will be something quite unexpected, especially to her.

Timothy has also dabbled in directing during his time at Puget Sound and spent countless hours his senior year developing stitching skills in the costume shop.

THEATRE ARTS SEASON

The Department of Theatre Arts offers several dramatic performances each year. A faculty-directed production takes stage each semester in the Norton Clapp Theatre, along with Student Directed One-Acts in late fall and the Senior Theatre Festival in April. Recent faculty-directed plays include A Streetcar Named Desire, Tartuffe, Iphigenia at Aulis, Angels in America, Part I, Romeo and Juliet, Kiss Me, Kate, and Arcadia. Students have directed and designed such plays as All My Sons, Big Love, Top Girls, Richard III, Fefu and Her Friends, The Glory of Living, and Anton in Show Business as part of the Senior Festival. The Matthew Norton Clapp Endowment for Visiting Artists brings outstanding contemporary theater makers to campus for workshops and presentations. Past guest artists have included Bill T. Jones, Guillermo Gomez-Peña, Godfrey Hamilton and Mark Pinkosh, Holly Hughes, Steven Deitz, and Russell Davis, as well as Pulitzer prize-winners Edward Albee and Robert Schenkkan. Theatre Arts encourages all university students, regardless of major, to participate in all aspects of theatrical production, both onstage and behind the scenes. NORTON CLAPP THEATRE

Norton Clapp, chairman of the Laird Norton Company and president and chairman of Weyerhaeuser Company, served as a trustee for more than half of University of Puget Sound's first century—from 1933 until 1995. This 62-year term included work with four University presidents (Todd, Thompson, Phibbs, and Pierce). Mr. Clapp served as chairman of the board for 19 years and later was named chairman emeritus and then honorary chairman of the board, for a term running "forever." The board reported that "no other trustee in the history of University of Puget Sound has contributed for as many years or more significantly than Mr. Clapp in advancing the institution's national academic standing, nor has any trustee been more admired or appreciated by so many students, alumni, faculty, staff, and trustees." The board of trustees named the Inside Theatre the Norton Clapp Theatre in 1998 to commemorate his committed service to University of Puget Sound.
